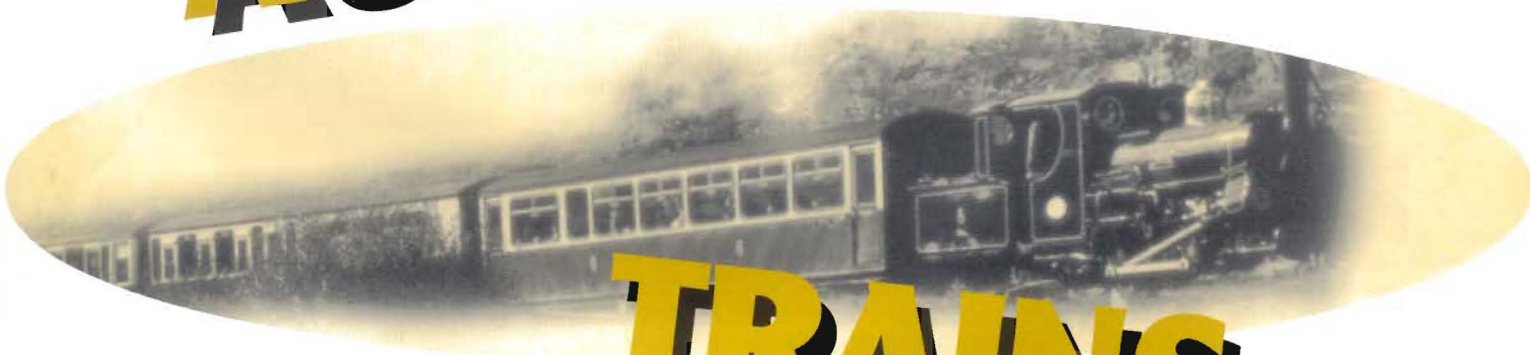

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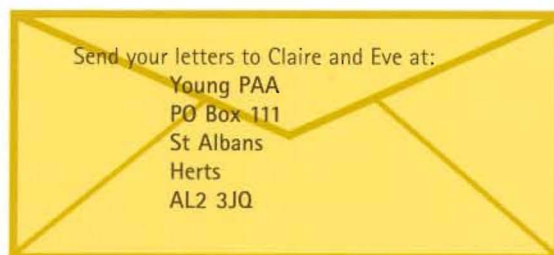
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Young PAA News

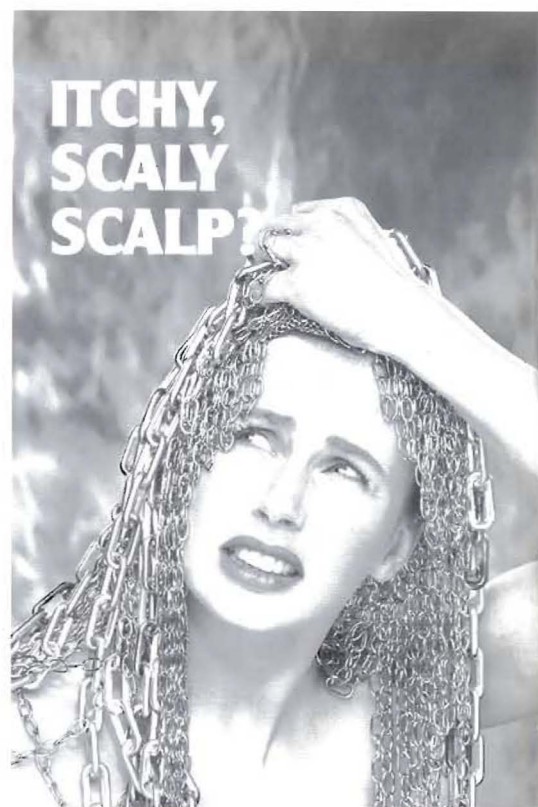

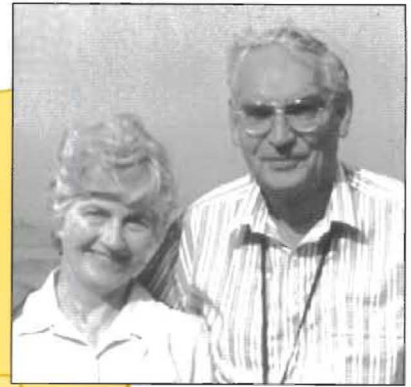

Slipped disc 1969, disc still slips very occasionally and makes right leg much worse.

P.A. diagnosed 1972, initially by local doctor and then confirmed by Guy's. Swollen left knee and scaling scalp and a few small patches of psoriasis on body and scalp.

Attended Guy's Hospital for some years. Draining of knee and cortisone injections not successful.

After some years left knee improves - right knee becomes very swollen.

Liberal use of Betnovate cream and Synalar gel seemed to eliminate most of the psoriasis spots on body but still very persistent traces on scalp.

Transferred from Guy's to Purley Hospital, 1980, but another course of injections and draining of knees again not successful.

November 1986 breast cancer, right breast, diagnosed early and a lumpectomy carried out. Resulting radiotherapy on left breast banished the remaining psoriasis spots which happened to be under it.

In 1989 I went privately to Shirley Oaks Hospital where I was offered three alternatives: carry on as I was, strong pain killers or an operation on my worst (right) knee. The prognosis of an operation did not sound too good and as strong pain killers affect my stomach I decided to carry on as I was.

In following years knees much the same but then I had a left-sided stiff neck, a swollen right ankle and slightly swollen left and right elbows. Scalp still slightly scaly.

I have fallen over on numerous occasions without any warning at all, my ankle appears to give way. I walk best in

track shoes or lace-up shoes but have even fallen over in these.

About two years ago irritable bowel brought about by a wheat intolerance was diagnosed at the Middlesex Hospital. I have suffered from indigestion all my life.

I still have nasty bouts of arthritis and sometimes have to take Anadins for the pain. Very occasionally I have to take Benorylate but try and avoid it as much as possible as it upsets my stomach.

In 1995 I visited Barts as part of their Volunteer Research Programme and they removed some fluid from my knee and a small patch of psoriasis from my bottom.

Other possibly relevant facts:

My maternal grandfather had psoriasis for a number of years, was a very active man who lived to 82 years and, as far as I knew, no arthritis. My mother had multiple sclerosis for more than thirty years until her death at 78 years.

This all sounds a "bit mis" but I have enjoyed life and had a part-time job in a florist for 16 years (standing in a freezing shop), enjoyed raising two healthy girls (although one occasionally gets slight eczema on her wrist).



Disability does not mean Failure

The first disability I encountered in my life was at the age of 7 months when I contracted polio, or poliomyelitis (infantile paralysis) as it was then called. Now I am left with a weak right leg shortened by 2 inches.

Then in 1974 I contracted rheumatoid arthritis, which started in the thumb of my right hand, then later moved across to my left hand thumb, and steadily increased throughout my body. Nowadays I have it mostly in my upper body, hands, arms, neck, shoulders and back, but also I have weak knees from falling down on them some years ago.

The psoriasis started in the early 90's but I cannot give an accurate date. I think it was through an allergic reaction to modern living. I only have very small patches on my legs, elbows, lower back and behind my ears, etc.

In the years between I have also had an ulcer from arthritic tablets and developed high blood pressure/cholesterol.

I believe although it cannot be proved that the arthritis was triggered by an accident in about 1971 when a car was pulling out from a road on my left in order to turn right, so crossing my path. I swerved to the right into the middle of the road and we both came to a rest against a traffic bollard. No major injuries were

sustained but I had jarred the base of my right thumb against the steering wheel.

My most recent employment problems started when I was made redundant from the position of Night Cashier/Sales Assistant at a petrol station. I had this job for seven years previously, until 6 February 1997, and the garage franchise had changed once before this situation occurred.

So, back in December 1996, the garage franchise was sold for the third time to a new company with the most ridiculous name of Pump Fiction Ltd. From the start things did not look good, and in March 1997 they had a complete shop refit plus an air conditioning system fitted which cost them a lot of money. This they needed to recoup, so in April 1997 they decided that keeping the garage open 24 hours a day was not viable, and gave me short notice of my redundancy. It took some time to get all the money that they owed me for the redundancy, wages and money in lieu of notice, but it's all settled now.

I went straight into the Employment Service office and booked an appointment with the Disability Employment Adviser. When discussing my work possibilities the adviser asked me if there was any other line of work I had in mind and I said "Yes computers". So a short time later when a vacancy on a course became available, I started a 12 week course in

Information Technology. The course started with the basics of word processing and finding the way around the computer controls, then on to the more technical aspects like spreadsheets, mail merge, graphs, etc. A short time later we also started an administration course. So now I have an NVQ at level 2 in IT and Administration.

Now I'm back in the job market with my new qualifications. But since then (September 1997) I have not been able to get a job as I do not have enough work experience in an office environment. Out of 77 jobs I have applied for, ranging from Receptionist, Telephonist, Secretary to Administration Assistant etc, I have only obtained seven job interviews to date. I cannot say if a disability has an effect upon employment, although the major employers such as East Sussex County Council, have an ongoing non-discrimination policy. But now I am glad to say I have just been offered a work trial (six weeks temporary work) starting Monday 9 February, through the Employment Service for People with Disabilities, at the Eastbourne District General Hospital in the Medical Records department. Sometimes, but not always, there can be a job that results from this temporary work. I cross my fingers.

What's New



At the PAA office we have received a number of enquiries about Psorigon, a German cream and body lotion recently launched in the UK, which has recently received extensive media attention in, for example the Daily Mail and the Sunday Mirror.

We therefore decided that it would be worth having a look at this new product in more detail so that you can decide for yourselves.

A Swedish pharmacist, who also, with his children, had a lifelong battle with psoriasis, first formulated Psorigon. To create his formula, he turned to the natural world, to the plants and trees he knew had traditional properties for the treatment of skin complaints.

One of its active ingredients, for example, an extract from the tropical Neem tree, was used to treat skin problems as long ago as 1500 BC in India and Burma. Neem works as a disinfectant, lowers the temperature, and acts as an anti-inflammatory agent. No wonder the respect Indians hold for this miraculous tree. Religious Hindus bathe in water into which they dip twigs from the Neem tree on New Year's Day. This is seen as a good omen for health in the coming year.

Extract from the Cystus flower is another active component. Cystus, native to Mediterranean lands, was used by the Egyptians as long ago as 400 BC and is effective in the treatment of dermatitis.

Camphor, extracted from another tree, provides a characteristic fresh smell and helps to soothe itching skin.

This novel formulation of some 25 natural ingredients worked very well for the Swedish pharmacist, his family and the local patients he treated. He then met a German pharmaceutical manufacturer, a fellow psoriasis sufferer, who developed the

formula for a wider market - and in 1998 Psorigon was born.

Dr. Schwarz, the German biochemist involved in the development of the product, is a firm believer in products based on natural ingredients. One of his future projects close to his heart involves the study of the effect of photosmog (a mixture of UV light and exhaust smoke), which he believes might be one of the triggers for psoriasis.

Psorigon was received with great interest by the medical profession at the recent Annual Conference of the British Association of Dermatologists in Brighton. During an interview Dr Schwarz, who had specially flown over for the event, welcomed the open-minded attitude of the British medical profession and expressed his pleasure that some doctors had come to find out more about the product on the recommendation of their patients!

The fact that Psorigon is based on natural products continues to find favour amongst people with psoriasis who have had long-term exposure to drug-based therapies. Also, its tar-free composition further appeals to users, as does its easy, once-a-day application.

In the meantime, the manufacturers are working on a shampoo, and also on a nail cream. Both products are available in the autumn. We'll keep you posted!

STOP PRESS: Since writing this article, we have learnt that the Psorigon name will not be used any more, and that the product will from now on be called 'PS-98' (see photo). The Scalp Shampoo is now available at £13.50 and the nail creme is expected before Christmas.

Wales - Accessible to All

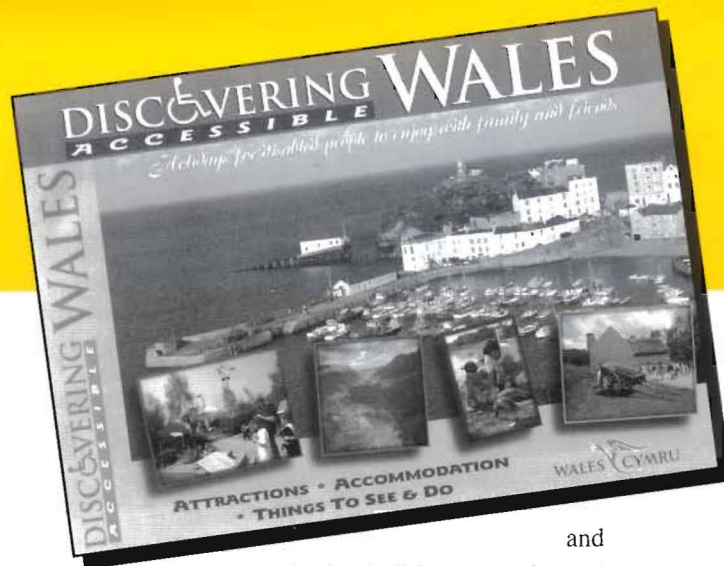
The newly updated second edition of 'Discovering Accessible Wales', the holiday guide for people with disabilities, is now available from the Wales Tourist Board.

'Discovering Accessible Wales' is a 56 page, full colour, glossy brochure offering disabled visitors a wide range of objective access information. More than 400 locations in Wales were reviewed by the WTB's adviser on the provision of disabled facilities, Bob Donaldson, who is himself a wheelchair user.

The guide is divided into four areas - North Wales, Mid Wales, West Wales and South Wales. Each section contains details of not only a wide range of accommodation in the area and its accessibility, but also gives comprehensive details of the accessibility of tourist attractions, beaches, Tourist Information Centres, theatres, eating places and parking facilities. Suggested mini tours and ideas for days out are also included, as well as a section on getting to Wales and an explanation of the various grading systems in the guide.

"The first edition of 'Discovering Accessible Wales' was so well received that we decided to produce an updated edition," said Bob Donaldson. "The purpose of the brochure is to give disabled visitors sufficiently detailed and reliable information to make their own holiday choices confidently. It includes not only places appropriate for people who are able to use a wheelchair independently, but also for many other people with levels of impaired mobility."

Bob Donaldson's own experience of planning day trips and holidays were that most guides did not recognise the different requirements, wishes and expectations of both the disabled visitor and their families and friends. 'Discovering Accessible Wales' seeks to treat the visitor with disabilities as a holidaymaker and an individual who has varying access requirements. It recognises that any individual on holiday is looking for new experiences



and lasting holiday memories and the guide also reflects the quality and diversity of the tourism product on offer in Wales.

Considerable effort has been put into ensuring that all the information in the guide is accurate, objective and reliable. As in the last edition, all entries have been verified by the Wales Tourist Board and all facilities at establishments have been graded by wheelchair users and have been awarded one of three grades: accessible to an independent wheelchair user; accessible to a wheelchair user travelling with assistance; accessible to a wheelchair user able to walk a few paces and up a maximum of three steps.

Wales Tourist Board Chairman Mr Tony Lewis said, "Wales has so much to offer all of its visitors and we are committed to the development of access for disabled visitors to all parts of Wales. The positive response to 'Discovering Accessible Wales' has been encouraging and we are delighted that more establishments

than ever have signed up to be part of the guide. It is evidence that more and more operators are realising how vital disabled facilities are to the tourism industry in Wales."

New Deals for Disabled People - The Gateway Partnership

At least 165 disabled people from Hampshire and the Isle of Wight will be helped towards employment by the Gateway Partnership.

Every disabled person selected for the programme has the opportunity to attend a free 7-day personal development course. A personal adviser is allocated to every participant, able to advise on benefits, on training for new skills and on developing employment prospects.

As part of the Government's New Deal for Disabled People, the Partnership aims to help disabled people who want to work and those whose jobs may be in jeopardy after illness or recent disablement. The Gateway Partnership provides innovative training and support so that disabled people can develop their potential, self-confidence and motivation. The experienced personal advisers will develop a wide range of employment opportunities for the participants, with complementary disability awareness training available for employers. The Gateway Partnership is one of the ten Government funded

schemes testing new and different approaches to helping disabled people into employment.

An important feature of the Partnership is the involvement of a very wide range of agencies including key Hampshire players: the Training & Enterprise Council, the County Council, Employment Services, the Employers' Network on Disability and Disability Matters Ltd. They will be working alongside significant employment organisations such as the Post Office, Blue Arrow, UNUM Ltd., the Employers' Forum on Disability and Meridian Broadcasting. All of these, and hopefully more to come, are providing expertise or resources to ensure the Partnership makes a real difference for disabled people.

- then a call to Learning Direct may be the first and most important step to take.

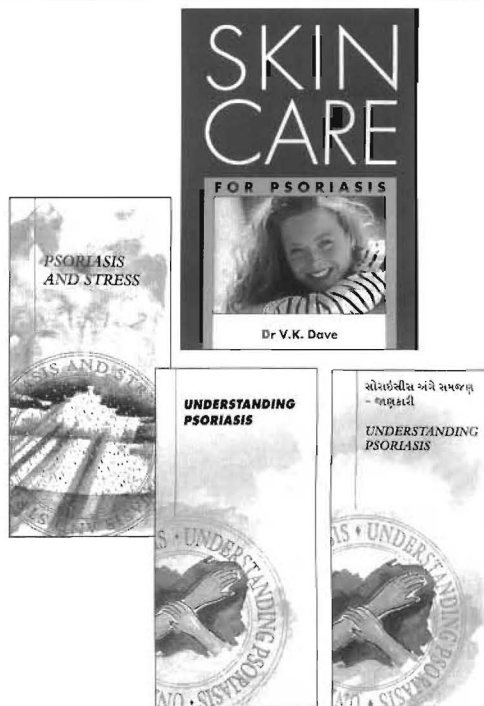
Employers who want to develop their people will also find the helpline experts have plenty of information and advice at their fingertips about business-related learning.

GREEN LIGHT TO ORANGE BADGE LEAFLET

The first comprehensive multilingual guide to parking concessions for disabled drivers across Europe has been produced by the AA.

The leaflet - Using the Orange Badge Abroad - offers a clear and simple explanation of the rights and privileges enjoyed by disabled drivers while motoring on the Continent.

Using explanatory paragraphs in 13 different languages, it also alerts officials to the fact that the Orange Badge symbol gives the driver the same exemptions as the local disability scheme.

Dominic Connell, AA Policy Adviser, says: "There has been massive interest in the advice leaflet and it is clear that this type of advice has been sorely

needed for a long time.

"Disabled people rely on the car much more than able-bodied people when they travel abroad and the advice card could be indispensable to them."

The advice card has received the backing of the Department of the Environment, Transport and the Regions, the Royal Association for Disability and Rehabilitation, the Disabled Drivers' Motor Club, the Joint Committee on Mobility for Disabled People, the Alliance Internationale de Tourisme and the Federation Internationale de l'Automobile.

And because the controls are fitted to existing fixing points, removal is easy at a later date when the owner wishes to trade-in the Golf, hopefully, for another.

A further unique attraction is that factory approval of the new controls means that the Golf's class-leading warranty package - a three year/unlimited mileage mechanical warranty and a 12 year anti-perforation cover - is maintained.



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
